People Who Remember Their Former Lives

The studies of people who remember their former lives involve a great deal of time, manpower, and money; from making a case, tracking observations, confirming the evidence to writing a report, it usually takes several years or even more than a decade. One year and ten months after her death—on December 11, 1926—she was born again in Delhi.

But one day, a doctor friend who came to visit the family heard this six-year-old girl describing the process of a C-section in great detail. He was shocked. Why?
